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GPOC Director's Report July 2022

Statistics for First Half of 2022 – Clinics – 15; Patients Served – 163 (133 for same period 2021); 120 Livingston County Residents; 72 – CSBG, 33 – United Way 15 CARES; 43 Out of County

Out-of-County residents – Funding for patients outside of Livingston County is very limited, yet we receive more referrals for assistance from those who live outside of Livingston County. It has been necessary to forestall needed treatment because of a lack of funds. I am hopeful that this year's annual appeal will be successful to cover these costs.

UR/Noyes Liaison – GPOC is working with the billing, laboratory and administrative staffs to smooth the transition to new procedures and personnel. We have also reached out to radiology services to eliminate the issues regarding reporting results and billing GPOC for these services.



Everyone has been most gracious with our inquiries. In the last month things have improved. **E-Partner** – We have been successful in becoming an E-Partner, which enables us to access medical, lab and radiology results in the U of R system.

RHIO – We have made attempts at partnering with RHIO; however, that application is still pending. This partnership would allow GPOC access to medical records from other sources in the area.

Diabetic Health Fair – The Diabetic Coalition met in March, after a two-year hiatus, and sponsored our Diabetic Health Fair on March 31. This event was the first since the pandemic. Volunteers cooked and served a healthy meal for attendants and assisted providers and attendants throughout the event. Dr. Andrew Merkel, podiatrist, volunteered his time to examine and treat foot conditions. Alan Cook, audiologist, performed free hearing tests, and Dr. Chris Rubeck offered his chiropractic expertise. Representatives from Cancer Services, Noyes Health Services, Dr. Dolan's Optometry practice, Wegmans Pharmacy and diabetic patient advocates were on hand, as well.

Annual Health Fair – This is in conjunction with the GUMC Annual Yard Sale on 8/27/2022. L. Weaver is coordinating the providers and volunteers for this Fair.

Grants –

• The CARES Grant of \$75K has been spent as of April 1, 2022. The Grant was awarded in April 2021 and was due to end 18 months later.

• The CSBG Grant funds of \$43K allotted for this fiscal year, which began October 1, 2021, are now being utilized to serve those who fall below 200% of the federal poverty guidelines. Congress has continued to maintain this cap at least until the end of summer. As of this writing there is only \$8,999 left to be

- reimbursed from this grant. Our next grant allotment will begin 10/1/2022.
- We have received a \$2,500 grant from the Mary Clark Thompson Foundation for out-of-county diabetic patients.

• GPOC was not awarded \$5,000 grant from Excellus for chronic care management of diabetic patients. This is a highly competitive grant.

• GPOC has applied for \$25K grant from FY23 Charles Schumer Congressionally Directed Spending Request also for chronic disease care targeting the Hispanic/Latino members of our surrounding area. We have been informed that our request will be included in the Directed Spending Request to Congress.

• United Way Grant is due in May and GPOC is requesting \$40K. In 2021 we received \$30K. In March,

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Linda Weaver and I presented to the Livingston County Board of Supervisors regarding the impact GPOC has on Livingston County and its resdents. We have not yet heard about our allocation.

Pharmacy Update – Members of the POC staff have been working diligently to find ways to cut costs of prescription medications for our patients. When paying at pharmacies, staff have requested GoodRX or inhouse discounts. Kirsten Galliford, D. Pharm, continues to meet with patients to enroll them in Patient Assistance Programs offered by pharmaceutical companies. Medication samples from the pharmaceutical companies have been more difficult to obtain.

As always, I am eternally grateful for all our volunteers who faithfully serve.

GPOC earns an NAFC 2022 Gold Rating



The National Association of Free & Charitable Clinics (NAFC) Quality Standards Program. We earned this rating by attesting that we have certain policies and procedures in place to provide quality care for our patients.

Adopt-a-Shelf/Assist with Medication

As more individuals are temporarily unable to work, their ability to obtain food, personal hygiene items, and medications becomes more difficult.

Our pantry is well stocked, but we do not get a price break on items such as toilet paper, shampoo, and laundry soap. If you or an organization that you are a member of would like to adopt one of these items and keep the shelf for that item stocked, it would be most helpful. Just let us know which item you are adopting and we will let you know when it is running low.

Another opportunity for serving is to assist our clients with prescription expenses. In March alone we experienced a 500% increase in prescription-assisted expenses.

Listed below are the costs of four of the many drugs our clients need.

- Lantus, a long-acting insulin commonly used to treat diabetes: 1 box of 5 pens is \$340. There are 308 units per pen, so depending on the dose the patient requires. A patient may be using 30 units per day on the low side to 100 units per day on the high side.
- **Trulicity,** a newer non-insulin drug for diabetes which is injected weekly: Trulicity 1 box is \$771.
- **Symbicort,** combination inhaler for asthma or COPD, taken 2 puffs twice a day: 1 inhaler is \$263 for the generic.
- **Spiriva,** an inhaled drug for asthma or COPD, taken 2 puffs daily: Spiriva Respinat is \$150 for 1 inhaler.

Medication costs vs living expenses: If clients need to choose which bills to pay, they may stop taking their medication to save money. This decision could worsen their condition and could increase the likelihood of more emergency room visits and hospital stays

If you or your organization can support shelf items and/ or medications, please respond to the GPOC ASAP with your wishes.

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Happenings at the Food Pantry.

Special thanks to volunteers Linda Meyers, Marilyn Russell, Jim Swanger and Jerry Weaver who work faithfully in the Pantry as often as they can.

I wrote a solicitation letter to Barilla in Avon and we received five cases of spaghetti along with six cases of sauce. A big thank you to the staff at Barilla who helped me comply with the company's needs for appropriate paperwork. I will do this again in December.

A call came in from CVS offering to donate personal protective

equipment. The next thing I knew my husband Dave and I loaded up a cargo van and my car with PPE for GPOC. We received masks, gloves and examination gowns. After filling our shelves, we sent the rest to an organization that is helping the people of Ukraine.

Jerry and I have been working on a grant from Catholic Charities and on FEMA monies for our Food Pantry. We truly need this as the grant monies from Foodlink are less than what we have received in the past. We are asking for \$5,000.00 to help our Pantry needs for clients.

A great wedding anniversary challenge was given to the G.U.M.C. of donating jars of peanut butter in July. The challenge was 60 jars of peanut butter for 60 years of marriage. As of 7/22/22 we have been given 82 jars.

Also, I am working on getting products from Kraft in Avon. We need to meet their requirements for this donation and then I plan to stock the Pantry with mac-n-cheese, pasta and/or the lunch-ables.

We are juggling monies and donations to the best of our abilities in order to meet our clients' needs for food. We need funds or donations for gas cards as well.

Here are our reported numbers for the Pantry Jan. to June 2022: 241 persons over 60 yrs. 100 children 366 adults 269 families Last year's total of grocery bags was 1,096
